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Martha Perez Announces Candidacy For Portland City Commissioner



Martha Perez

"I am delighted and extremely pleased to announce that I am in the process of running for Portland City Commissioner.

For your information, I am a Native Oregonian and Engaged Portlander, a

graduate of Portland State University, a single parent of a daughter (also named Martha Jr.) and do not consider myself a career politician, although I do have a decade of governmental experience at the grassroots, local, county, state and federal levels, working on a wide array of programs such as healthcare, energy efficiency, positive revenue-creation and environmental research, as well as practical, hands-on collaboration within a multi-disciplinary and diverse constituency."

"This is a particularly urgent time in the history of Portland's political landscape, because we have more than one position opening on our City Council, including a bid for Mayor. There are currently no women (in particular, women of color) being represented on the City Council and I am applying for one of these positions, because I believe I can get the job done to the best of my ability and high value placed on ethical conduct. Due to my vast experience in government, I understand the types of issues that our city is facing."

"There's a lot that I could do to make this city a better place to live. Many of our roads, bridges, streets, infrastructure, etc., are crumbling and that poses a safety hazard—I cringe at what was allowed to happen in Minnesota. We need healthcare (including mental health services) to be made available to every single person, but the question I pose is this: does it start with worker empowerment (nurses, doctors, care-providers, etc) or with patient rights?"

Living wage jobs need to stay in Portland, period. I like the concept of building streetcars locally, for example. There's got to be a healthier relationship between police efforts and neighborhoods. I question this relationship and seek solutions.

Did you know that there's a two-year waiting period for certain public housing programs and that hundreds of people need housing NOW? Despite all that we've done to stop homelessness and hunger, these problems still exist and it could be your next door neighbor?

Neighborhood associations must re-claim eir public place. I believe in helping small businesses thrive and I would try to strike a balance between local industry and big business, to be fair.

More accountability in government is an obvious factor that we'll continue to look at. Let's increase our dialogue about climate change, preservation and energy efficiency. Let's address the realities of racism and other 'ism's' that exist not just in Portland, but in every city in this nation.

We realize that the war in Iraq was a mistake. How about creating peace? What's been happening with our civil rights and how do we restore them back, post-911?

What about the sorry state of affairs, with respect to Portland Public Schools? K-20 education (including a college degree) is a right that every child has to have, if we are to thrive in the future. What can we do that we aren't already doing? How can we walk our talk, most importantly?"

"I don't claim to have automatic answers to the issues I've just posed above; however, I can continue to build upon the legacy left behind by great legends such as former governor Tom McCall, or former Mayor Vera Katz or Erik Sten, who's now resigning from his term as City Commissioner, No. 2, Housing Department.

I applaud the VisionPDX plan by City Council, I encourage readers to learn more about something called the Regional Atlas Plan and I'd like to see more diverse, younger faces show up at hearings conducted by City Council on a wide variety of issues".

"I know that if I were elected City Commissioner, that I won't always be in agreement with my colleagues on all of the various issues; however, there is an important element called RESPECT and I think it's something that's in limited supply at City Hall. I'm really excited to do all I can to keep Portland weird, too, because I don't want our town to end up looking like a cookie-cutter clone version, whatsoever. Some things are just sacred, but I'm not mixing religion with politics, ever".

Gordon Hillesland Announces Candidacy For House District 42

I have deep roots in Portland. Members of my family first came to Oregon in 1870. I grew up here, graduating from Woodstock Grade School and Franklin High School. I earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree and a Certificate in International Business Studies at Portland State University, completing an AIESEC internship at the President Hotel in Capetown, South Africa. I enlisted in the United States Navy, completed SERE Training and spent a year in Viet Nam supporting the River Assault Group while stationed with 9th Infantry Division at Dong Tam.

I have been employed by Wagner Mining Equipment in Portland and Brussels, Belgium, providing parts replacement, finance and transportation service to international dealers and customers. Later, I was employed as a Revenue Officer by Internal Revenue Service. This employment allowed me to learn about the revenue compliance systems which should be used by government and those which are currently used.

I have three sons, the youngest of whom spent 15 months in Iraq with 37th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Division, with time out for wound recovery at Walter Reed Hospital.

I want to become a State Representative because there is a need for the state government to have more revenue to provide goods and services which government should provide. Because of my experiences, I can see that people currently working in government are not working toward optimizing government revenue. As a result, the government has less money than it should have to provide for its citizens.

Currently, revenue producing laws are not enforced and too many tax discounts are given to special interest groups. These trends must be stopped. The state budget must be written to provide for optimum compliance of revenue producing law. Tax discount laws must be repealed. Only after these steps are taken will we be able to work toward providing services state government should provide. The State

of Oregon 2007-2009 Tax Expenditure Report, describes tax discounts to special interest groups. You can find out how to obtain this report by calling the Budget and Management Division at telephone 503.378.3106. Repealing many of these discount laws would greatly increase revenue to the government. However, 36 votes are required to repeal the tax discount law, and require the members of the special interest group to pay tax on the same schedule as everyone else.

The interpretation of the Oregon Constitution, which requires the super majority to repeal tax discount laws, needs to be reviewed and the use of this interpretation needs to be discontinued.

Corporation income tax only provides 5.9% of General Fund revenue. The connection to the federal definition of taxable income is forecast to reduce Oregon corporation income tax revenue by roughly \$248 million. In addition, there are seven Oregon specific subtractions which can further reduce corporate income tax. The tax rate for corporations is 6.6%. There are 40 tax credits available to corporations. These credits are expected to reduce corporation tax revenue by roughly \$71 million.

We need to repeal the kicker. Any economic entity would have difficulty operating if it was not allowed to save one year's surplus to cover expenses during a future year with reduced revenue.

Property taxes throughout the state must be related to property value so everyone is contributing relatively equally. Federal timber tax revenue will no longer be distributed to timber producing counties, which have relied on this revenue for years to provide government services such as education, law enforcement and social services. Currently, Multnomah County property owners pay about \$10.00 per thousand dollars of value. Josephine, Douglas and Curry County property owners pay 58 cents per thousand dollars in value.

If elected, my main priorities would be to insure revenue producing law compliance, reduce the number of tax discounts to special interest groups, refer property tax limitations to voters and sever the connection of state tax to federal tax. These actions would allow an increase of revenue to the state without creating new taxes or increasing current taxes.

Is it too much to expect some leadership from our electeds? How about expecting them to have a rudimentary knowledge of global, or hemisphere economics before they go off half cocked?

After NAFTA was passed by the Clinton administration US agribusiness flooded the Mexican market with government subsidized corn. This action destroyed the indigenous agriculture market in Mexico. The result was 1,500,000 Mexican farmers went broke and left their farms looking for work. This had the understandable effect of driving down wages in Mexico. Is it so hard to understand that when people can no longer earn a living wage where they live that they would take Ronald Reagan's advice and "vote with their feet"?

The question is why did our reps in Salem duck the real issue in favor of supply side economics? They could have done something meaningful – such as instructing our federal legislators, via a joint Senate and House resolution, to actively work to repeal NAFTA CAFTA and the Peru Free Trade Agreement.

These agreements along with "Most Favored Nation" status for China have been disastrous for Oregon workers (costing us over 55,000 family wage manufacturing jobs). All the while these agreements have had catastrophic effects on the foreign workers that were supposed to benefit from

How disappointing, in its first attempt at needed annual sessions our elected representatives in Salem climbed on the anti-immigrant band wagon rather than taking any real steps to protect Oregon jobs. At the same time their cowardly action has the potential to

them. Having a debate over the merits of such a resolution would have done wonders for educating Oregonians on the harm of free trade, as the media reported on the debate.

Rather than having such an educational debate the Lege decided to scapegoat immigrants by taking away their driver's licenses. How does taking away the ability to regulate drivers and their ability to purchase liability insurance, benefit Oregonians?
